Mission Statement

The National Kidney Foundation of Kentucky seeks to prevent kidney and urinary tract diseases, improve the health and well-being of individuals and families affected by these diseases, and increase the availability of all organs for transplantation.

Public and Patient Education

The Kidney Early Evaluation Program (KEEP) of the National Kidney Foundation of Kentucky offers a free health screening to identify individuals with CKD and encourage participants to delay the onset of the disease. KEEP screening tests include blood pressure, weight and height measurements, and blood and urine analysis. In addition, participants consult with an on-site health professional, are provided with physician referrals for follow-up care and a variety of educational materials. The NKFK partnered with 12 community and health organizations to screen 838 at-risk individuals. A staggering 64% of participants learned they may have kidney disease.



In partnership with the Chronic Disease Prevention Team of the Louisville Metro Public Health and Wellness and the Diabetes Prevention and Control Program, the NKFK launched a diabetes and chronic kidney disease public awareness campaign in Louisville.

The campaign warns the public of the risk diabetes poses to kidney health and urges early detection and treatment to delay the progression of kidney disease. Campaign materials included bus shelters, magnets, and pizza box stickers that urge the public to get tested for diabetes and kidney disease. The NKFK distributed 500 door hangers that offered the opportunity to attend a NKFK kidney health screening (KEEP) and free diabetes management classes offered by the Louisville Metro Department of Public Health & Wellness. Other awareness efforts included radio and print public service announcements.

The NKFK is the leading source of information and education for the public and kidney disease patients. Free literature about the treatment and management of kidney disease are distributed to the community, dialysis clinics, health centers, health care professionals, patients and family members. The foundation's newsletter, *Kidney Connection*, provides prevention and treatment information and was distributed to 2,500 people each quarter. The CKD class provides vital information to those in Stage 4 of CKD and covers treatment options, good nutrition, and healthy coping. The program served 66 CKD patients.

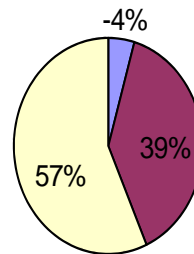

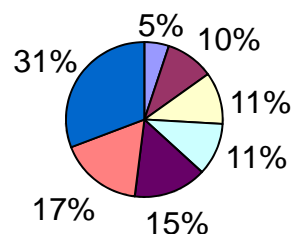

Team Kentucky



Team Kentucky are recipients of any life-saving organ that participate in the U.S. Transplant Games, a biennial Olympic-style games to call attention to the success of organ donation and transplantation. The transplant games showcase the success of transplantation while calling attention to the critical need for donors. Team Kentucky comprised of 29 athletes from ages 3-75.

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Patient Programs

The Patient Assistance Program provides financial assistance to dialysis and kidney transplant patients who are experiencing emergencies. The program provided \$37,000 to patients experiencing financial hardships with utility, housing, medication, and transportation needs. Over 160 patients were awarded a grant through the program.

The Medical Identification Jewelry Program provides free necklaces or bracelets to kidney patients and transplant recipients. Over 100 patients were provided life-saving ID jewelry.

Public Policy

The National Kidney Foundation offers the People Like Us Take Action Network, an e-advocacy effort to strengthen support among congressmen for legislation concerning kidney disease and organ transplantation.
